Additional Information:

- "There are two events in the history of a house of worship which are notable -- the laying of its corner-stone and its dedication. The one marks its initial stages, the other its completion; the one is an act of promise and expectation, the other declares that promise fulfilled and that expectation realized. The foundation stones of the second house of worship of the First Congregational Church, Wellesley Hills, were laid in March, 1901, but the copper box, with its freight of documents, sermons, programs and photographs, was not lowered into its place in the southwestern corner of the tower until October second of the same year. After a lapse of nearly sixteen months from that auspicious day, another and much larger assembly gathered in the church itself, a completed structure. The date was February 17, 1903. The object was to surround this house unto the Lord in solemn dedication. MORE DETAILS The Wellesley Hills Congregational church is built upon distinct Gothic lines, which were in vogue five centuries ago in England. It marks the period of transition from the decorated to the perpendicular style. The three large windows resemble that at Edington, Wilts, near Bath, which bears the date of 1361, very graceful and symmetrical in curvatures and blendings. The tower of the new church has called forth much favorable comment and delights the eye by its massive proportions, a splendid reproduction of the towers that form so striking a feature of such English churches as Brislingten, Somersetshire (1500) and of the little church at Stoke Pogis, with its tower ivy-mantled and alluring to the eye."
